WHERE THE WORLD OPENS UP

The Accountability Pillar surveys are administered annually and throughout the province, during the months of January to March to:

- Students in Grades 4, 7 and 10;
- Students in Grades 4 through 9 (in small schools);
- Parents of students in Grades 4, 7 and 10; and
- Teachers.

Students and teachers complete the surveys online at school while parents receive a copy of the survey that can be completed online, or by mail. Parent surveys are returned directly to Alberta Education.

Responses are collected and tabulated into a summary chart released in May and are updated in October to supplement updated academic achievement results through the Provincial Achievement Tests (grade 6 and 9) and the Diploma Examination results (Divisional and First Nations, Métis and Inuit specific). These achievement reports are provided in a separate summary report on our school's website.

This Accountability Pillar Results Report includes our school's overall summary and new results for all survey measures.

Approximate Survey Responses:

- 17 parents in our school responded to the survey. This is up from 16 last year. Unfortunately, low survey responses may not accurately represent our parent population.
- In Parkland School Division, approximately 459 parents responded to the survey. The five-year average for parent responses is approximately 406.
- In Parkland School Division: 2,560 Students (960 in grades 4-6, 700 in 7-9 and 900 in 10-12) responded; this included 71 Grade 7 students who responded from our school.
- In Parkland School Division, 457 teachers responded; this included 21 teachers from our school.

These are approximate numbers as not every respondent answers every question.

Highlights and Celebrations

Greystone Centennial Middle School continues to celebrate the strong work of staff, students and our overall community.

• Under the measured category of Safe and Caring Schools, Greystone Centennial Middle School has improved its result by 6.3 percent from the previous year. More than 90% of the parents agreed that their child is cared about by their teacher and their child is treated fairly by adults in the school. More than 80% of the students agreed positively in the same category.

- Under the measured category of Programs of Studies, where parents, students, and teachers are satisfied with the opportunities for students to receive a broad program of studies including fine arts, career, technology, and health and physical education, Greystone School improved significantly by 9.3% increase from the previous year. Greystone School offers a broad range of programs for students, including a flexible Daily Physical Activity program, embedded occasions for the use of technology and software in school work, a strong French as a Second Language program, and adaptable and emerging opportunities for the Career and Technology Foundation options. GCMS has also improved access to music instruction over the past two years, including classroom music, choir, and Grade 7-9 options.
- Greystone School had a reduction under the measure of the high school drop-out rate which declined from the previous year to zero percent in the current year. Greystone school has continued to work hard to support students while at GCMS and to work collaboratively with the area high school to ensure students are placed appropriately and have a successful transition from Grade 9 to 10.
- Under the measured category of Citizenship, Greystone School improved its results by 9.6% from the previous year. 76.2% of teachers, parents, and students agree or strongly agree that students model the characteristics of active citizenship. Students are encouraged to try their best at school (student: 97%, parents: 88%) and be involved in activities that help their community (parent: 63%, student: 60%). Students at Greystone are given multiple opportunities to engage in community activities such as WE Day, Annual Terry Fox Fundraising, Kinette Christmas Hamper, and WE CARE.

Parkland School Division's Ultimate Goal is Student Success and Well-Being. To this end, the Board's current Education Plan targets nine assurance elements in student growth, teaching and leading and learning supports.

There are still some areas for growth within our Accountability Pillar Survey results. Greystone Centennial Middle School is committed to improvement and continuing to learn and grow with our community. Areas Requiring Strategic Planning

- Under the measure of work preparation, Greystone results increased slightly from the previous year at 68.5% but is well below the provincial average. Thirty-seven respondents (teachers and parents) agree that students are taught attitudes and behaviours that will make them successful at work when they finish school. Greystone school will continue to advocate to students about the value of completing high school, encourage entrepreneurial spirit through Career and Technology Foundation, and make connections with the business community regarding various 21st Century occupation paths.
- Under the measure of parental involvement, Greystone results (67.5%) has a slight decline from previous year (70.2%). Responses from 17 parents indicate a diminished satisfaction with involvement in decisions about their child's education. Greystone School will endeavour to openly communicate with the parent community through newsletters, social media, remind app, email, google classroom, parent-student-teacher interviews, and School Messenger. We will actively embolden volunteerism from our parent community to encourage involvement in GCMS.
