## Background

## The Accountability Pillar surveys are administered annually during the months of January to March to:

- Students in Grades 4, 7 and 10;
- Students in Grades 4 through 9 (small schools);
- Parents of students in Grades 4, 7 and 10;
- Teachers.

Students and teachers complete the surveys online at school, while parents receive a copy of the survey by mail and are asked to return the completed survey directly to Alberta Education. Student responses are grouped within the Tell Them From Me survey process. Responses are collected and tabulated into the summary chart released in May and are updated in October to supplement updated academic achievement results through the Provincial Achievement Tests (Grade 6 and 9) and the Diploma Examination results (Divisional and FNMI specific).

## Accountability Pillar Survey Responses

- Responses to the surveys were received from approximately 8 parents, down from 26 last year. Unfortunately, low survey responses may not accurately represent our parent population.
- In Parkland School Division, approximately 298 parents responded to the survey (the five-year average for parent responses is approximately 401).
- In Greystone Centennial Middle School, approximately 453 students responded to the survey.
- In Parkland School Division, 3,932 students responded (1,530 in Grades 4-6; 1,129 in Grades 7-9; 1,273 in Grades 10-12).
- 29 teachers responded.

These are approximate numbers, as not every student answers every question.

## Highlights and Celebrations

- The Safe and Caring Schools survey measure showed an overall improvement over last year. $84.4 \%$ of teacher, parents and students agree that "students are safe at school, are learning the importance of caring for others, are learning respect for others and are treated fairly in school." This measure includes $89.7 \%$ of parents, an improvement of $17.4 \%$ from last year, and $92 \%$ of teachers, an improvement of $1.7 \%$ from 2015-2016. There was a decline of $4.2 \%$ from $75.8 \%$ to $71.6 \%$ in the student satisfaction.
- The percentage of students achieving the standard of excellence on Provincial Achievement Tests improved from 11.7\% in 2015-2016 to 15.3\% in 2016-2017. This includes improvements in Standard of Excellence results in 2016-2017 from the previous 3-year rolling average, in ELA 6, Mathematics 6, Social Studies 6, ELA 9, Science 9, and Social Studies 9.
- The Tell Them From Me 2016-2017 student survey data indicates that 83\% of Elementary (Grade 5-6) students reported positive relationships; the Canadian norm for these grades is $81 \% .92 \%$ of the girls and $76 \%$ of the boys in this school reported positive relationships. The Canadian norm for girls is $84 \%$ and for boys is $78 \%$. In the Secondary (Grade 7-9) survey, $81 \%$ of students reported positive relationships; the Canadian norm for these grades is $75 \%$. $79 \%$ of the girls and $85 \%$ of the boys in this school reported positive relationships. The Canadian norm for girls is $81 \%$ and for boys is $69 \%$.


## Areas Requiring Strategic Planning

Parkland School Division's Ultimate Goal is Student Success and Well-Being. The Board's Education Plan targets four strategic goals that contribute to the Ultimate Goal:

1. Inclusive Education
2. Quality Learning
3. Culture of Wellness
4. Universal Leadership

Our school's plan for education aligns to the Board's Education Plan. Some areas that will be addressed in our education plan are:

- A decline in the percentage of teachers, parents, and students satisfied with the opportunity for students to receive a broad program of studies, including fine arts, career, technology, and health and physical education.
- $65.9 \%$ overall: $57.5 \%$ of students, $59.3 \%$ of teachers and $81 \%$ of parents are satisfied with these opportunities. This is a decline at the school level, and is also below the 2017 provincial overall average of $81.9 \%$.
- The 3-year rolling average at the school level also saw a decline from $72.2 \%$ to $69.8 \%$ overall.
- Academic: Provincial Achievement Tests Results
- Grade 6 Science Provincial Achievement Test (PAT) saw a decline at the Acceptable Standard.
- 72.8\% of GCMS students achieved the Acceptable Standard on the Grade 6 Science PAT, down from the 3-year average of $81.3 \%$, as well as below the provincial result of 76.9\%.
- Grade 6 Mathematics PAT results at both the Acceptable Standard and the Standard of Excellence also saw a decline.
- $68.9 \%$ of Grade 6 Math PAT results were at the acceptable standard, down from the 3 - year average of $74.1 \%$. This is also below the provincial level of $69.4 \%$ on this PAT.
- Grade 6 Math PAT results at the standard of excellence were $9.7 \%$; this is an improvement at the school level from the previous 3-year average of $8.5 \%$, but below the provincial average of $12.6 \%$.
- Grade 9 ELA PAT saw a decline at the acceptable standard.
- 70.4\% of students at GCMS achieved the acceptable standard on the Grade 9 ELA PAT, which is a decline from the previous 3 -year average of 74.3 . It is also below the provincial level of $78.7 \%$.
- The components and measures dealing with "Preparation for Lifelong Learning, World of Work, Citizenship"
- A decline in the percentage of teachers, and parents who agree that students are taught attitudes and behaviors that will make them successful at work when they finish school: 88\% of teachers, but only $50 \%$ of parents feel that students are taught these attitudes and behaviours ( $69 \%$ overall). This is below the provincial results of $82.7 \%$ overall, including $75.1 \%$ of parents and $90.4 \%$ of teachers.
- In terms of the attitudes, skills and knowledge necessary for lifelong learning, we made some modest gains at the school level, but our results are below the province. Overall, only 53.7\% of students, teachers and parents are satisfied in this regard; the provincial rate is $71.0 \%$. Only $40 \%$ of parents are satisfied, as compared to $64.8 \%$ in the province.
- A decline in the percentage of teachers and parents satisfied with parental involvement in decisions about their child's education.
- An improvement was made in the school results (from $64.1 \%$ to $71.9 \%$ ), however, the results are still below the provincial average of $81.2 \%$. This is a declining trend over the 3 -year rolling average.
- $81.3 \%$ of teachers are satisfied. $62.5 \%$ of parents are satisfied; this is up from $41.4 \%$ the year before.
- A decline from $80.5 \%$ to $76.1 \%$ in the satisfaction of parents, teachers and students who indicate that their school and schools in their jurisdiction have improved or stayed the same in the last 3 years, according to the 3 -year rolling average; this is also below the provincial results of $80.7 \%$.
- $72.8 \%$ overall: $75 \%$ of parents (up from $50 \%$ ), $67.3 \%$ of students (down from $82 \%$ ) and $76 \%$ of teachers (down from $82.8 \%$ ) feel that their school and jurisdiction have improved.
